Statement of Pan-Hellenic conditions: There are four women's fraternities organized in the college: Gamma Phi Beta (National), Kappa Delta (National), Delta Delta Delta (National) and Tau Epsilon Tau (local). These fraternities have a local Pan-Hellenic league composed of two representatives from each of the four fraternities and a chairman who is a member of the faculty.

This league regulates all rushing and pledging. Rushing begins with the Pan-Hellenic ten under the auspices of the council. To this all new women students and women faculty members are invited. Rush season begins three weeks after the opening of school and continues for two weeks. During this time each sorority is allowed one formal function and several minor affairs.

Invitations in the hands of the chairman are sent out by her. All girls who have one or more invitations shall be first asked by the chairman to give her written preference vote, in order that she may receive but one invitation.

If rules are broken by a women's fraternity, pledges are forfeited for a year.

The league has proved very unsatisfactory during the six years of its organization.
