The state of Florida is famous for its A B C's —Alligators, Beaches, Climate—plus orange juicé. Now it can add its four Kappa Alpha Theta chapters.

The local Tri Chi sorority at the University of South Florida, Tampa, became Delta Rho colony of Kappa Alpha Theta on March 30, 1969—our 95th chapter. The formal pledging was presided over by Dorothy Whitehurst Heard, Grand Council member-at-large, and Virginia Wiggins Childs, college president, District XVIII. Theta alumnæ members from Clearwater, St. Petersburg, Largo and Tampa assisted. Gale Hays became the colonizer. The colony has placed first in scholarship the past three quarters.

The University of South Florida was founded in 1956. Though the first classes were not held until 1960, the enrollment has already reached 14,000. The University's only tradition is innovation. Seven other national sororities and 13 national fraternities have installed chapters. The 1700 acre campus with its physical plant of 34 fully air-conditioned buildings is valued at more than \$45 million.

Though vacation had started, 68 loyal Delta Rhos stayed in Tampa, eager to fly the Theta kite. Tuesday evening, June 17, the Loyalty Service was held in the President's Dining Room, with a social afterwards to meet the national installing officers: Norma Anderson Jorgensen, grand president; Dorothy Schulze Vaaler, executive secretary-treasurer; Lucile Moore Garrett, Dorothy Whitehurst Heard, Martha Smith White, members-at-large on Grand Council; Virginia Wiggins Childs, Ruth Robie Lacy, district presidents, college and alumnæ respectively; Gale Hays, colonizer; Cay Womack, song leader; Elizabeth Talley, new resident counselor; Rosemary Nilson, Central Office.

Theta collegiates from the Universities of Florida, Georgia and Tennessee; Florida State, Emory, Duke and Louisiana State Universities, along with area Theta alumnæ, helped with the initiation.

The big night—June 19—finally arrived. The formal banquet was held at the Carrollwood Golf and Tennis Club attended by 150 Thetas and guests, all singing the praises of Theta (lit-

erally) under the leadership of song leader, Cay Womack. Grand Council installation chairman, Dorothy Heard, was toastmistress and lighted the candles in honor of the four founders. College District President Virginia Childs gave the Theta welcome followed by the response from Linda Anderson, Delta Rho president. Alumnæ District President Ruth Lacy talked on Theta service. Many Thetagrams were read by Colonizer Gale Hays.

Honored guests were Dr. John S. Allen, president of the University of South Florida, and Mrs. Allen, who brought greetings; Dr. Herbert J. Wunderlich, dean of student affairs, and Mrs. Wunderlich. Assistant Dean of Women Linda Ericson delivered the address. Other honored guests were Mrs. Phyllis P. Marshall, director of student organizations, and Miss Cozbie Reed, Alpha Delta Pi and past Tri Chi adviser, who was presented a gift by Grand President Jorgensen for her work with the local group.

The charter service was then held in the Red Room of the Carrollwood Golf Club. The week's festivities came to a close with the model chapter meeting, held in the University Center.
