Although Alpha Zeta chapter at Barnard College returned its charter in 1915, the influence of Kappa Alpha Theta remains. Due to the efforts of Jean Town. ley Leich, Alpha Zeta, '13, who calls herself "the last survivor," the existence of a Theta scholarship at Bar, nard has been confirmed. Jean Leich remembered that a scholarship fund had been established by Alpha Zeta alumnæ in the New York area who met together for "delightful meetings for many years and raised money for a modest scholarship." The Alpha Zeta scholarship was never mentioned in the Barnard Alumnæ Magazine, so Jean Leich took it upon herself to find out what had become of the money. The gift was \$2,000 added to from the proceeds of a yearly bridge party which yielded fifty to one hundred dollars. Jean Leich's husband, the late Chester Leich, famed painter and etcher, donated a framed etching which had received an award in a French exhibition, for a door prize raffle to benefit the fund.

And now comes the great news from Barnard College that the scholarship fund is now valued at \$21,038.11, yielding approximately \$1,200 annually for a scholarship award to a graduating senior who shows promise of distinction in her chosen work.

A high school graduation we wouldn't have missed for anything brought great pride to this one time advisory board chairman. Last June as the first graduates of University Preparatory Academy received their diplomas, a giant step in the career plan of Jane Campbell Seymour, Alpha Lambda had been reached. Jane Seymour was a founding teacher and prime mover of this new private school in Seattle. She is now president of the board of trustees and remains a dedicated science teacher. With a liberal arts emphasis, the school sets out to prepare students for college, which goal has been accomplished with the first class who were all accepted to the colleges of their choice, and which includes a national merit scholarship winner. It is one of the continuing privileges of having once been a chapter advisor that you never lose interest in "your girls."
