Epsilon Tau: Theta establishes a Yale tradition

Kappa Alpha Theta, the first Greek letter fraternity known among women, is also the first and only National Panhellenic Conference group on Yale University's campus.

A unique group of sophomore Yale women entered the pledgeship of Epsilon Tau colony of Kappa Alpha Theta September 29, 1985. From that day on, the women of Epsilon Tau were determined to experience the traditions that have made Theta what she is today, and to enrich the social life at Yale. They battled the negative stereotypes of the Greek system held by some Yale students, as well as their own questions about this "new" women's fraternity that was forming at Yale.

During their pledgeship, the Yale collegians gathered at weekly meetings, enjoyed sitting together at football games and took part in social activities with the men's fraternities. They also hosted a Halloween party for underprivileged New Haven children as a service project.

The Epsilon Tau pledges sometimes invited college masters and deans to join them at their Monday night dinners. This proved to be an excellent opportunity for the women to explain exactly what Kappa Alpha Theta is, and why they believe it has a place at Yale.

Alumnae support was another positive aspect of the Epsilon Tau pledgeship. The Fairfield Alumnae Chapter hosted a shower for the

colony, and New Haven alumnae took an active part in the colony's Big/Little Sister Program.

Installation of the 109th chapter of Kappa Alpha Theta took place January 24 through 26 in New Haven, Conn. The Theta-filled weekend began Friday with the loyalty service and continued with the initiation ceremony Saturday morning. The banquet and charter service were held at the Yale Graduates Club. All those present clearly felt the warmth of Theta within that traditional Yale setting. Final events on Sunday included a model chapter meeting, church service and a campus reception, held at the Pierson College Common Room.

The Epsilon Tau installation team included: Grand President Sue Supple; Grand Vice-President Finance Carryl Krohne; College District President Joyce Ann Vitelli; Alumnae District President Margaret Ricks; Central Office Associate Executive Secretary-Treasurer Ann Meeks; Betsy Sierk, Central Office administrative assistant; and Melissa Crane and Kim Massey, chapter consultants. The local installation chairman was Avery Flowers, and Alpha Epsilon Chapter at Brown University shared their loyalty and dedication to the Fraternity by serving as the assisting chapter.

Throughout their pledgeship, the ten Epsilon Tau charter members watched each other gain respect and pride in the ideals and traditions of Kappa Alpha Theta. They learned
